ALUMNI STORIES



VIETNAM AND AUSTRALIA – GROWING STRONGER TOGETHER

In his role as Head of Microbiology at the National Hospital of Tropical Diseases **Dr Van Dinh Trang** has maintained a strong professional relationship with his PhD supervisor, Professor Dominic Dwyer, since graduating from the University of Sydney in 2019.

Dr Trang and his research team collaborated with Professor Dwyer and his team to implement genome sequencing procedures which have supported the rapid identification of new COVID-19 variants in Vietnam. Their ongoing connection has also resulted in joint research publications linked to COVID-19 as well as other areas of genome-sequencing. Dr Trang's team is also developing research links with the University of Queensland around the development of effective antibiotics for multi-resistant bacterial strains.

MAKING A CONSIDERED DIFFERENCE FOR ETHNIC MINORITIES

Dr Tran Thi Quang Hong says her PhD experience at Monash University fundamentally changed the way she goes about analysing problems and researching new topics, and she wants to share this with others.

Returning to the Ministry of Justice after completing her PhD in 2016, Dr Hong used her newly developed knowledge and skills to engage in research into ethnic minority customary law and how it interacts with state laws. She and her team travelled to remote regions to speak with ethnic minority representatives and learn of their viewpoints. Her team's report included recommendations on how customary law can be factored within the mainstream legal system. It has been referenced by several local government bodies considering the possible local level implications of such developments.

Continuing her efforts to break down community silos, Dr Hong set up *Legal Connect* to support the Vietnamese legal community to form support networks and share information.



SUPPORTING STUDENTS TO ACHIEVE THEIR BEST



As Lecturer at the College of Medicine and Pharmacy at Hue University, **Dr Dang Thi Anh Thu** has introduced new ways of interacting with students, adapted from her study experience at the Queensland University of Technology. Dr Thu's PhD research assisted her refresh her framework for teaching topics around environmental health. She incorporated perspectives on both climate change and disaster management as she became aware of their increasing impact on the health sector.

She encourages her students to take on personal responsibility for their performance – they need to decide how much time and effort they commit and she will support them to succeed but not 'carry' them. Dr Thu remembers clearly an Australian lecturer handing back good work to her and encouraging her to aim for a higher level.
